

Sunway's Australian matriculation students excel

THE Australian Matriculation course is one of several pre-university programmes offered by Sunway College.

The qualification allows entry into all universities in Australia and most in the UK, Canada, New Zealand and the US.

Sunway's Australian Matriculation students have done well although they complete the programme in a shorter period compared to students in Australia.

Said Paul Albert, the chief executive officer of the Curriculum Council from Perth Australia: "I am pleased that Sunway Aus-

tralian Matriculation students are able to excel within the seven or eight months of studies when most students complete their studies in one year."

About 190 students were recently presented with certificate of completion during an Awards Day ceremony at the college.

Two top students Khoo Kay Loong and Chew Ching Hong were presented with the Award of Excellence and the Principal's Shield respectively.

Khoo, who also received the subject awards for Applied Maths and Informa-

tion Systems, scored the highest accumulated points in the examination.

Chew, who also received the subject awards for Economics, English and Chemistry, was selected for the Principal's Shield not only because he was the top student in his class but also because of his involvement in other fields.

Other recipients of subject awards were Khor Joe Nice for Human Biology and English Second Language, Angela Yap for History, Chin May Ghee for Advanced Malay, Chan Kah Hoong for Chinese Ad-

vanced, Teo Wan Ping for Accounting, Elisabeth Tucker for Discrete Maths and Wong Voon Siong for Physics and Calculus.

Admission requirements for the programme are five Sijil Pelajaran Malaysia/O-level/Senior Middle Three credits or other equivalent qualifications.

There are two intakes for the programme in a year — in January and in March. The next intake is on Jan 6.
